







UGANDA'S VISION FOR A MODERN HEALTH SUPPLY CHAIN

A guiding roadmap toward strengthening local capacity and ensuring sustainability

In 2022, Uganda launched a 10-year roadmap to advance a shared vision of a modern, donor-independent health supply chain. The roadmap lays out the government's strategy to strengthen the capacity of its ministries, departments, and agencies (MDAs) to plan, finance, and manage the national health supply chain by outlining measurable targets and investments for the short-, medium-, and long-term. It focuses on eight priority areas, including human resources, governance, financing, and digitalization of the national health information system.

A ONE GOVERNMENT APPROACH TO DELIVER LIFESAVING RESULTS

The roadmap leverages capacities within MDAs and maximizes existing resources to achieve Uganda's supply chain priorities. Led by a health supply chain interministerial task force (IMTF) of ministries, donors, and development partners, this "one government" approach brings together stakeholders to share political ownership and consensus on actions. This provides a basis for coordinating resource allocation and accountability processes to achieve and sustain the roadmap objectives. Dozens of public and private stakeholders came together to create and commit to Uganda's health supply chain roadmap—a timeline that is exceptional given its overlap with the COVID-19 pandemic.

UGANDA'S 10-YEAR HEALTH SUPPLY CHAIN ROADMAP TIMELINE: 2020–2032

PLANNING

June 2020–September 2020

Conducted a stakeholder mapping of parties with diverse interests and determined their potential influence on the supply chain. The map included MDAs, civil society organizations, private-sector actors, and health development partners that USAID's Strengthening Supply Chain Systems (SSCS) Activity targeted for engagement throughout the development process.

Developed a stakeholder engagement plan detailing methods of engagement, outreach materials, schedule, and desired outcomes. SSCS organized a series of meetings to reach out to as many stakeholders as possible to orient them on roadmap objectives and the one government approach.

INCEPTION

October 2020–June 2021

Established an IMTF Subcommittee

(IMSC) with 42 members to lead the writing process. SSCS helped the IMSC develop a concept note, workplan, and timelines for developing the roadmap.

Set roadmap priorities and agenda through virtual stakeholder meetings that produced eight priority areas ranging from human resources and infrastructure to financing.

Created leadership buy-in through oneon-one meetings with nine MDA leaders to underscore the one government approach as key to the roadmap's success—working as one entity toward shared objectives.

WRITING June 2021–October 2021

Held two consultative writing retreats

with the writing committees. Five subject matter experts provided technical support to draft and produce a final version ready to submit for approval as a national living document.

Estimated implementation costs using an activity-based costing approach with MDA budget staff to identify key inputs and functions of proposed interventions and their unit costs. The estimated cost of implementing the 10-year roadmap, including procurement of essential medicines and health supplies, was USD 7.85B.

APPROVAL

October 2021–December 2021

Coordinated review, approval, and sign-off by various Ministry of Health structures, including the top management team, and the IMTF.

Convened a high-level meeting to discuss multisectoral collaboration in roadmap implementation, garnering ownership among the top leadership of 10 MDAs.



LAUNCH January 2022

Top government leaders launched Uganda's 10-Year Roadmap for Government of Uganda's Health Supply Chain Self-Reliance at a ceremony, with ministries

making public commitments toward reaching the government's supply chain objectives.

IMPLEMENTATION Ongoing

Eight MDAs developed roadmap implementation plans for fiscal year (FY) 2023/24 according to their commitments.

MONITORING Ongoing

USAID SSCS Activity coordinates with Office of the Prime Minister as the IMFT Chair, and with its Co-chair, and the National Planning Authority to monitor stakeholder commitments and milestones outlined in the roadmap.

A YEAR OF IMPACT

Since the launch of Uganda's 10-Year Health Supply Chain Roadmap in January 2022, ministries have acted on their commitments.



Office of the Prime Minister coordinates MDAs to support implementation

Advised all MDAs to allocate resources for roadmap commitments



Ministry of Local Government oversees local implementation

Instructed districts to plan for 10-year roadmap supply chain activities in FY2023/24

Ministry of Health provides technical oversight and a conducive policy environment for implementation in partnership with Ministry of Local Government, the USAID SSCS Activity and other partners

- Trained 615 leaders from 33 districts, cities, and municipalities and 17 hospitals in supply chain leadership, management, and governance; leaders developed 50 supply chain implementation plans
- Held 121 health supply chain leadership and coordination meetings in 77 districts and 27 hospitals; 814 district and health facility leaders reviewed supply chain performance indicators and mapped improvement strategies

Ministry of ICT and National Guidance supports health supply chain digitalization

- **Connected 84 health facilities** to national internet backbone out of 600 facilities committed over 5 years
- Deployed district information, communications, and technology officers to support roadmap commitments

Ministry of Energy and **Mineral Development** provides electricity to health facilities

- Committed to providing electricity to 830 health facilities and 73 districts over 5 years
- Named first 400 health facilities to receive solar off-grid electrification



Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development funds implementation

- Published the National Budget Call Circular advising MDAs to allocate resources to their committed priorities in FY2023/24
- Committed UGX 464B (USD 123.7M) to procure essential medicines and health supplies for FY2023/24
- Provided an additional UGX 24B (USD 6.4M) to procure essential medicines and UGX 50B (USD 14M) for antiretrovirals in FY2023/24
